Shared Goal: Reaching 80% Screened for Colorectal Cancer

Background

Colorectal cancer is a major public health problem. It is the second leading cause of cancer death, and a cause of considerable suffering among more than 145,000 adults diagnosed with colorectal cancer each year. However, colorectal cancer can be detected early at a curable stage, and it can be prevented through the detection and removal of precancerous polyps.

Commitment

We have screening technologies that work, the national capacity to apply these technologies, and effective local models for delivering the continuum of care in a more organized fashion. 








BRFSS Measures 2012 - 2020

BRFSS Screening Rates Up-to-Date (UTD) US Adults 50-75 Years




NHIS Screening Rates Up-To-Date (UTD) US Adults 50-75 Years

UDS Screening Rates Up-to-Date (UTD) U.S. Adults 50-75 Years











New NCCRT Priorities

- On-time screening (as soon as eligible whether average or increased risk)
- 2. Timely colonoscopy follow up to abnormal stool test
- 3. Understanding / addressing the source of disparities
