
Andrea Cercek, MD

Melinda (Mindy) Conklin, MS, MEd,



Gloria Coronado, PhD

Gloria Coronado, PhD, is an epidemiologist, health disparities researcher, and Associate Director for Population Sciences at the University of Arizona Cancer Center and Professor in the Department of Epidemiology and Biostatistics at the University of Arizona. She has more than 25 years of experience developing and testing community- and practice-based innovations and leading health disparities research programs in multiple healthcare settings. A key focus of her research centers on leveraging electronic health record information and using risk-stratification tools to deliver appropriate preventive care services, including colorectal cancer screening and follow-up, to patients who may benefit the most. A hallmark of Dr. Coronado's research is its focus on underrepresented racial and ethnic populations. Dr. Coronado is a member of the Board of Scientific Advisors for the National Cancer Institute, and she previously served on the National Academies of Science, Engineering and Medicine Committee on Improving Representation in Clinical Trials and Research.









Anjee Davis, MPAA

Anjee Davis, MPAA, president of Fight Colorectal Cancer (Fight CRC), has championed growth and impact since joining in 2011. She has expanded the organization's grassroots movement, engaging thousands nationwide, and launched the One Million Strong campaign, inspiring the #strongarmselfie movement. Her advocacy contributed to the lowering of the recommended colorectal cancer screening age from 50 to 45 in 2021, and she is actively working to eliminate out-of-pocket costs for follow-up colonoscopies after positive tests.

Anjee has led international collaborations focusing on early-onset colorectal cancer and immunotherapy, aligning survivors and advocates with the Cancer Moonshot initiative. Her efforts were instrumental in passing the Removing Barriers to Colorectal Cancer Screening Act in 2020 and in founding the State-by-State Catalyst Program, which now supports 12 states with grassroots funding.

She serves on multiple advisory councils and boards, including the NCI's Clinical Trials and Translational Research Advisory Committee, chaired the NCI's Council of Research Advocates for two terms, and was appointed to the President's Cancer Panel. Anjee's work has been recognized with honors such as the Betty Anne Moore Community Leadership Award and the Prevent Cancer Foundation's Laurel Award for Advocacy. Previously, she directed a statewide awareness and screening initiative at the University of South Carolina's Center for Colon Cancer Research and managed a basic science cohort funded by NIH. Anjee holds a bachelor's degree from Southwest Missouri State University and a Master of Public Policy Administration from the University of Missouri St. Louis.


Yla Flores


Esther Hyun

Steven Itzkowitz, MD, FACP, FACG

Steven Itzkowitz, MD, FACP, FACG, is a Professor of Medicine, Oncological Sciences, and Medical Education, and Director of the Gastroenterology Fellowship Program at Icahn School of Medicine at Mount Sinai. Dr. Itzkowitz is Chair of the National Colorectal Cancer Roundtable and past Co-Chair of its Family History/Early Age Onset Task Group. He is a member of the President's Cancer Panel Subcommittee on Colorectal Cancer Screening. He is a former Chair of the Gastrointestinal Oncology Section of the American Gastroenterological Association, and past Co-Chair of the New York Citywide Colon Cancer Control Coalition ("C5 Coalition"). His research has focused on reducing disparities in colorectal cancer screening in the general population, developing new noninvasive stool DNA tests to screen for colon cancer, and detecting and preventing colon cancer in high-risk individuals: inflammatory bowel disease and hereditary syndromes. His team at Mount Sinai was among the first in the nation to demonstrate the effectiveness of patient navigation to enhance screening colonoscopy adherence, proving also that patient navigation is cost effective. Since 2014 he has been an integral part of the medical school's efforts to enhance anti-racism education and training for students, trainees and faculty.








Djenaba A. Joseph, MD, MPH,

Djenaba A. Joseph, MD, MPH, is board certified in internal medicine and is a Captain in the Commissioned Corps of the U.S. Public Health Service. She joined the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention as an Epidemic Intelligence Service Officer in the Division of Cancer Prevention and Control (DCPC) from 2005–2007. John W. Kennedy, MD



Peter S. Liang, MD, MPH



Dr. Liang's primary research interest is colorectal cancer prevention. He studies sociodemographic and geographic disparities in colorectal cancer screening and outcomes, the comparative effectiveness of different screening strategies, novel methods to increase screening adherence, and earlyonset colorectal cancer. His research has been supported by the National Cancer Institute, National Institute on Minority Health and Health Disparities, Veterans Health Administration, American Gastroenterological Association, American Society for Gastrointestinal Endoscopy, New York Society for Gastrointestinal Endoscopy, ReMission Foundation, and industry.



Xavier Llor, MD, PhD

Xavier Llor, MD, PhD, obtained his medical doctorate from the Autonomous University Barcelona and then trained in basic research and Internal Medicine at the University of Chicago and completed his GI fellowship at the University of Illinois at Chicago. He complemented his training with a PhD degree in molecular biology from the University of Barcelona. A clinically active gastroenterologist, Dr. Llor's research and clinical interests relate to gastrointestinal cancer prevention. He has a very active basic and translational research program mainly focusing on three different aspects of gastrointestinal cancer: hereditary and familial forms, screening and prevention, and disparities. This work has resulted in over 100 scientific publications in this field. He has made seminal contributions to the fields of Lynch syndrome and other non-polyposis syndromic colorectal cancer cases, diffuse gastric and lobular breast cancer syndrome (DGLBC), and systematic approaches to inherited cancers.

Dr. Llor is Chair of Practice Implementation & Professional Education (PEPI) Health Systems of the American Cancer Society-CDC National Colorectal Cancer Round Table (NCCRT); vice-Chair of the colorectal cancer screening panel; and member of the Genetic/Familial High-Risk Assessment: Colorectal, Endometrial, and Gastric panel of the National Comprehensive Cancer Network (NCCN) guidelines. He is commonly invited to lecture in gastrointestinal cancer genetics in the US and abroad.


Stacie Miller, MSN, MPH, RN



Erin Peterson





Allison Rosen, MS






Kaitlyn Sylvester, MPA


Michelle Tropper, MPH, PCMH CCE






Richard Wender, MD

Richard Wender, MD, has dedicated his career to leading medical and public health efforts that strive to improve the quality of primary care, implement population health, and address social determinants of health in the continuous pursuit of equity for all people. He was recently appointed as the Chair of the Department of Family Medicine and Community Health, in the Perelman School of Medicine at the University of Pennsylvania. Dr. Wender spent the first 33 years of his career in the Department of Family and Community Medicine at Thomas Jefferson University, including 12 years as the Alumni Professor and Chair of the Department. At Jefferson, Dr. Wender and his team spearheaded innovative programs in geriatric medicine, palliative care, the patientcentered medical home, quality-based payment, refugee health, and community partnership. From 2013 to 2020, Dr. Wender served as the first Chief Cancer Control Officer of the American Cancer Society. Pascale M. White, MD, MBA, MS, FACG, is an Associate Professor of Medicine in the Gastroenterology division at the Icahn School of Medicine at Mount Sinai.
