Did you know Black women under 40 have higher breast cancer rates than any other group? The American Cancer Society is committed to changing this through equity in cancer care.

The VOICES of Black Women® study is a groundbreaking initiative by the American Cancer Society to partner with 100,000 Black women in the U.S. to better understand cancer risks and outcomes. Participation involves completing surveys online, starting with a one-hour survey and shorter follow-ups twice a year.

Join thousands stepping up for Black women's health. Here's how you can help:

- 1. **Enroll:** If eligible, I encourage you to join the study at <u>voices.cancer.org</u>. Just one hour a year can transform health outcomes for Black women everywhere.
- 2. **Share:** Spread the word to eligible Black women in your personal network. Your voice is essential in helping the collective fight against cancer.

Eligibility: Black women aged 25–55 with no cancer history (except basal/squamous skin cancer) living in the U.S.
