Affordable Care Act



ACA:

Most Private Insurers Must Cover Preventive Services without Cost Sharing

- US Preventive Services Task Force (Task Force)
- Advisory Comm on Immunization Practices (ACIP)
- Health Resources and Services Admin (HRSA) on recs by Women's Preventive Services Initiative

= 150+million people

Plaintiffs: Individuals and Christian-Owned Businesses



CLAIMS

Requirements violate the Appointments Clause of US Constitution

Appointments Clause – Art. II, Sec. 2 says superior officers must be appointed by the president and confirmed by the Senate; inferior officers do not need confirmation

Religious Freedom Restoration Act:

Violates their religious freedom under the *RFRA* to have to buy coverage for PrEP drug for HIV prevention





Task Force recommendations include


Judge O'Connor Ruling in *Braidwood*

- ACA's delegation to Task Force violates the Appointments
 Clause = unconstitutional = no recs since passage of ACA in
 March of 2010 enforceable by HHS for entire nation
- Upholds delegation to ACIP and HRSA because their recs have to be ratified by DHHS Secretary
- Requirement to cover PrEP violates Braidwood's religious freedom under RFRA (judge says would also apply to HPV vaccine if asked) – this claim then settles





Of United States Courts of Appeals and United States District Courts







- Stay during pending litigation
- Task Force structure unconstitutional but limits relief to *plaintiffs*
- ACIP & HRSA may be lawful but depends on actual process of ratification = remand



Cross-Petitions to the Supreme Court of US





SCOTUS

ONLY ACCEPTED QUESTION ON TASK FORCE

Held: the structure of the Task Force does not violate the Appointments Clause of the US Constitution because members are "inferior" officer under the supervision of the Secretary of HHS =

Upholds the ACA provision mandating coverage of Task force recommendations
